# Newsletter for Members of The East of England Area of NAFAS



Jacqui was assisted on stage by her husband John. Jacqui has kindly given permission for two of her designs to be shared.


The first design was traditional and created in a huge bowl made from pine cones using garden plant material, berries and tones of red and peach flowers.

"Our demonstrator for our Christmas Open Meeting was a man who has visited us many times and hardly needed an introduction, Lee Berrill.

His theme was called "Made for Christmas" and Lee provided us with six arrangements, most with additional twin arrangements and accessories created by himself. The foliage and flowers used were breath-taking in every way and the containers were awe inspiring. A CD rack found near a skip became a wonderful display featuring Christmas baubles and a stunning floral arrangement adorned the top. A box covered with seasonal fabric became a gorgeous arrangement incorporating improvised tubing decorated with braid and wool to depict tall candles. Terracotta pots with gilded parlour Chico palms, deep red Naomi roses, large Blind date Gerbera, red Carnations, Blue Spruce and Box along with accessories depicted a Christmas Tree.

The stage took on a most enchanting appearance whilst we were guided through each of Lee's designs. Our President Elsie gave the vote of thanks saying that Lee had cheered us all up after the last two years by showing us inspired ways to create different Christmas ideas. A truly enchanted evening in readiness for the Seasonal period. Members then enjoyed non-alcoholic punch and mince pies before the raffle.



Afterwards, June reminded us of future meetings and recommended telephoning a committee member (on you programme card), if you are unsure if any meeting is taking place because of bad weather or COVID. #### As we move towards Spring, Hannah Shine, Little Hallingbury Flower Club writes:

I want to thank everyone who asked me to make a wreath for them for Christmas. This was my fundraising effort for Grove Cottage and was very successful. The wreaths adorned many doors! I was fortunate that many recipients kindly sent me photos of their wreaths on their door! I made 25-30 wreaths and swags which raised £600 (£750 with gift aid added!) and Grove Cottage collected this just before Christmas. And all the material was from the garden.



We are now still clearing the garden of some of the debris of the winter weather and it is gratifying to see bulbs appearing all over the garden. As a flower arranger, a lot of my shrubs are evergreen so the garden looks colourful all the year round. Some of these are euonymous (many varieties), skimmia, sarcococca, eleagnus, camelia, nandine, eucalyptus, variegated winter box, white heather, rosemary, variegated laurel, phormiums; so there is always something to cut for a vase or table arrangement. I also have a large area where I grow Chinese lanterns and the beautiful orange pods have brightened up many a wreath. Did you know that if a Chinese Lantern has got squashed, you can restore it to its former glory by just blowing into the bottom of the pod. You will need to do this before it dries out. It is nice to grow some plants for their unusual stems too – Tortured hazel – Corylus avellana contorta.

Right now, the arum italicum pictum is looking spectacular! The foliage is beautiful in an arrangement. I also got a ceanothus with variegated foliage last year. It is called Lemon & Lime and makes a perfect foil for the beautiful blue flowers.

You are all welcome to come over anytime if you need some nice foliage for church flowers or indeed for yourself! I also propagate plants for sale. The garden is well stocked now, so it does not take long to walk around admiring what's looking spectacular and doing a small vase without using floral foam. I rarely have flower arrangements indoors as it is too warm and they don't last long. So I tend to put them on a unit in the porch, where they last a very long time, with the water changed often.



I will soon be sowing seeds of Salvia Turkestanica (a biennial but quite spectacular), and many varieties of cosmos. These are prolific grown in tubs and deadheaded or picked often, in so many shades of pink, white, frilly edged, picotee with dark pink edges. I save my own seeds and am happy to send some to anyone who would like them.

I hope to make some wreaths for Easter. I think wreaths are for every day not just for Christmas!

In January, the death was announced of the television gardening presenter Peter Seabrook. Jayne Lawson, Feering Flower Club, is the administrator of the Facebook page Flower Arrangers & their Gardens, posted this delightful, personal tribute to Peter which several NAFAS members responded to with their own recollections.

"Many of you in the UK and further afield will have been familiar with Peter Seabrook and no doubt remember his time broadcasting on BBC TV's "Gardeners' World" and also as a prolific writer on all sorts of garden topics. My partner's Dad knew him very well as PS worked on the seed trials which were once such a strong business here in Essex. And once my partner joined his Dad in their family seed business it wasn't long before Moles junior was himself learning from Peter. And when Mr Moles senior passed away Peter wrote such a kind letter to the family.

In later years we'd bump into Peter at various trade events and the two chaps would chat happily, even swapping ties one day when Michael admired a sunflower tie Peter was wearing. We once had the pleasure of his and his wife's company on a trip to Switzerland for a Fleuroselect convention one year. He had a very naughty sense of humour and turned a potentially tedious business meeting into a mirthful afternoon.

Latterly he instigated the Floral Fantasia at RHS Hyde Hall and that was the last time we met him. Peter was there extolling the virtues of the newly-introduced seed-raised varieties of plants to all the visitors but took time to greet us and chat about the seed trade.

RIP Peter, a true gentleman and one who will be much missed."

I asked Peter if he'd come and have a look at them and he was very complimentary about the NAFAS curriculum, particularly the botany element. There has been a great deal to celebrate since the beginning of the year. Candlemas is a Christian holiday celebrated annually on February 2, 40 days after Christmas. It celebrates three occasions according to Christian belief: the presentation of the child Jesus; Jesus' first entry into the temple; the Virgin Mary's purification after childbirth.

While it is customary for Christians in some countries to remove their Christmas decorations on Twelfth Night (Epiphany Eve) those in other Christian countries historically remove them after Candlemas. On Candlemas, many Christians (especially Anglicans, Methodists, Lutherans, Eastern Orthodox Christians, and Roman Catholics) also bring their candles to their local church, where they are blessed and then used for the rest of the year

#### Lesley Beeton, Wisbech team of flower arrangers writes:

"In February, it was our turn on The Ely Cathedral Flower Guild rota. This coincided with The Candlemas service. .Our team of five consisted of (see photo left to right) Ann Purt, Christine Austin, John Richmond; and (sitting in photo, Ann's sister) Veronica Marsden and me, Lesley Beeton. Ann, John and I are Wisbech Flower Club; Christine attends Kings Lynn Flower Club. We are all long-time friends. All the foliage came from our gardens and all 6 arrangements included candles. There is a large shelf attached to the pillar for 2 of the arrangements. The other 4 designs are on plinths. There are lots of other teams who take their turn throughout the year and create beautiful designs in the magnificent Cathedral."



The blessing of candles at the Purification is deeply rooted in Church History; since the 7th century, beeswax candles have been blessed on Candlemas. Candles made with beeswax are the only ones that should be blessed, because of the symbolism of wax, bees and their connection to virginity.


Candlemas was the day when some cultures predicted weather patterns. An old English song goes:" If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come winter, have another flight. If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, Go winter, and come not again". So if the sun cast a shadow on Candlemas day, more winter was on the way; if there was no shadow, winter was thought to be ending soon.

A regular & supportive attendee at Area & Group events, the Club's monthly meetings & events & often hosting garden parties which everyone enjoyed.
