Aylsham & District Flower Club

Some members of Aylsham and District Flower Club decorated the Flower Marquee at the Aylsham Show in Blickling Park this year. They have been doing this for several years and have raised thousands of pounds for charity. Each year there is a different theme, this year was "Happiness is..." and each member decided on their own interpretation. Some titles were "gardening", "playing board games", "my imagination" and of course "flower arranging."

A different charity is chosen each time, this year it was Big C. At the end of the day Tom from "Ireland's" auctioned off all the arrangements to a very generous crowd of show attendees, taking over £1200.



The Aylsham show gives us money for the flowers, the committee came up with the "Happiness is" theme then each arranger decided on their subject and interpretation. Obviously they shared their ideas to make sure things weren't duplicated. We all staged our own exhibits; the show supplied the marquee and bases. Some members plan together what they are going to do. The Aylsham show is a one day agricultural and rural show held in the grounds of Blickling Hall, all the usual country show things, livestock, two rings and loads of stalls, circus, fairground rides. It's always a lovely, well attended day, over 15,000 people this year.

"What a wonderful time we had on our visit today at **Rochford's International Rose Trial Grounds near Hertford**. The weather was glorious. We enjoyed coffee & biscuits on arrival and looking forward to what was to come even if the roses were now at the end of their growing season; but there was a reason for visiting this late in the season as you will see from the later photos.

Rochfords International Rose Trials trial roses on behalf of rose breeders from across the world. Varieties which are not yet commercially available are submitted to trial by the breeders. They are the only independent trials site in the UK which trials unnamed seedling roses providing a unique opportunity for rose enthusiasts to view and judge roses not yet available & today on our visit we were able to be judges for ourselves. Kerry explained what the judge has to look for based on the Rose Health, Flower, Overall Appearance & Scent. "We all set off with our clip boards; for some getting down to smell the roses had us bending low and needing help to get back up again but it was fun. All of the roses judged, it was time for a light lunch and an opportunity to ask questions about anything to do with roses, Kerry is so knowledgeable.

It was soon time for us to pick up our secateurs/scissors as we were given the ok to prune or pick any of the roses. The beds with roses that had been grown for 3 years were a popular row and our members had great fun snipping away."

It's something the JDS&E Committee feel is important to enhance the Continuous Professional Development of the Area and further promote the art of flower arranging.

By going along, members found out about the responsibilities and qualities required of a judge and had a go at judging a mock competition and awarding places. They also had a plant ID exercise to test what knowledge they already had. The taster day then helped them decide if they want to take it further.





Website Relaunch

The new website was relaunched on October 24th after intensive work by the media team and their technical adviser Phil Bean. The objective was not only to refresh its appearance, but to make it easier to find what you're looking for - in other words "easier to navigate the website" Everything is laid out before you from the "landing page" - that's what you see first of all when you click on.

It is now easier to get in touch with the website administrators if you have an inquiry because there is a "contact us" button on each page. Please do get in touch if you're experiencing a problem. The new "search" function is absolutely brilliant! For example, you want to get in touch with a demonstrator but you've forgotten the surname – just type the first name into search on the JDS&E page.

We're sure the new brightly coloured Media page is going to be really useful. One click takes you to all the information you need – whether it's how to create a QR code or you're looking for fundraising ideas. All this information is available in the printed media pack which has been circulated to all clubs, but the ability to access it on line means that it is available to all members. It should provide support when delegating tasks to less experienced people and encourage them to volunteer to do things (for example- producing a poster) which previously they may not have felt confident about.



There were some nervous moments as the old website was taken down and the new one loaded. You may have seen the "holding notice" explaining what was happening if you tried to access the website during that time. We didn't really know how long this would take, but fortunately it all went to plan. Then there was the task of testing it - looking for glitches. It is important that the website displays correctly on all types of mobile devises, not just a computer screen. So we all read it, clicked buttons, open pages on our phones & tablets, of all different ages & specifications. There were some issues; for example: jumbled lines of print, pages not scrolling down properly ... things that are really irritating for the user. As soon as we let Phil know he was able to fix it, like magic.

We will do our best to keep the website up to date, but please remember that to benefit you have to help us by telling us what information needs to be revised –for example, when new officer have been appointed or new venues are being used.

Everyone is busy with **Christmas workshops.....** this one's a bit different **.....Wroxham Flower Club** at Rackheath Village Hall.


On the evening of Wednesday 15th November we held our Festive Workshop which was very well attended by members and visitors.


